


Our first discussion focused on how AI can be used to calm ourselves, an important topic for us young adolescents in today's changing world

Overall, the exhibition was both informative and engaging, helping us appreciate India's cultural diversity and develop respect for the rich heritage of tribal communities. ♦♦

An interactive session with the parents of Early Years III


